NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

It was good to see lots of people on the village green for the party in July. The chatter scarcely paused whilst people moved under the limes or put up umbrellas to keep off the rain. Many thanks to all those who came and those who helped in so many ways.

You will see that the long-awaited seat is now in position on the green. More thanks, this time to those who gave aggregate and cement, lent tools and made the brackets for it, as well as those who gave time and muscle-power to put it in place.

On more serious matters, it might have been easy to get discouraged after the recent spate of break-ins in Hornton. It makes one very angry that these strangers can come into our village - even into our houses! - without our hearing or seeing them, disturbing our peaceful lives and taking our property. It has been suggested that we install closed circuit television (CCTV) at each end of the village. What are your views? The really good news, however, is that the two men involved have since been arrested.

But let's think positively: what can we learn? ALL of us must now make sure that keys, wallets and handbags are kept, not as we all do, in the nice convenient place near the door, but out of sight - in a cupboard or drawer perhaps, at all times. Do not leave downstairs windows open when you go out or at night, and consider fitting window locks.

And if they still get in and take your things? Spend that few minutes taking photographs of your property now! And very important - mark your property!! The newest technology is Alpha-dot. You paint a tiny blob of very hard varnish onto each item of property. Suspended in the varnish is a number of minute dots each bearing the number exclusive to the little phial you are using. They told the police who later discovered they had also been driving a stolen car. On another occasion Jenny Holt, hearing some hasty reversing noises followed by a bang as a van smashed into a parked car, took the number and reported it. And recently, despite a frightening amount of "verbal abuse" from the driver, she noted the number of a transit van used by three men who were knocking on people's doors asking if they had antiques to "sell" which was really useful to the police.

Brilliant! Hornton is getting good at this. Keep up the good work and remember, even if you don't hear of an immediate result, the information you give does help. You can leave a recorded message on 01865 266651 which is the Bambury Neighbourhood Watch Officer even though it has an Oxford number, or, if it is urgent, 01865 266000, or tell your Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator.

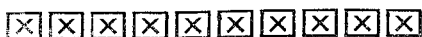

HARVEST THANKSGIVING

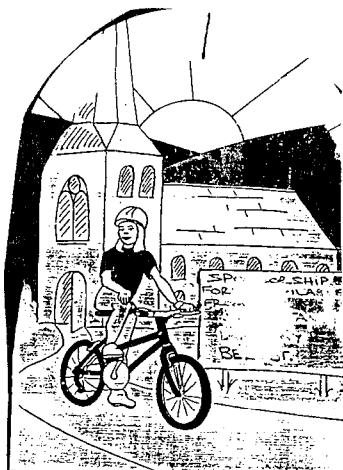

Doctors who treat children in third world countries are asking for them, as they have found that children who have their own teddies to cuddle in their cots get better quicker than those who don't have one. Each child keeps his own teddy and can take it home, so the doctors need a continual supply.

Full instructions are given below; they are very simple and quick to make and can be stuffed with old tights or any chopped up clean fabric. If you can make a little bag for your teddy, that would be most welcome but if not it doesn't matter as the teddies are the important item.

TEDDY'S KNITTING INSTRUCTIONS

Double knitting wool. Size 10 needles.
Main colour - for head and paws.
Trousers colour. Jumper colour.
Scarf colour.

Cast on 10 stitches main colour. Knit 10 rows. Change to trouser colour and knit 30 rows. Make another leg the same.

Knit across all 20 stitches and work 16 rows. Change to jumper colour and knit 24 rows.

Change to main colour for head, and also change to stocking stitch. Work for 5½ inches and change to jumper colour continue remainder of Teddy in reverse order.

Stitch down the sides of the head. With jumper colour pick up 8 stitches either side of the neck join and knit 20 rows. Change to main colour and knit 10 rows for paws.

Sew up Teddy leaving opening in crotch. Please stuff Teddy with only kapok or other healthy padding. Foam rubber is not recommended as babies may chew it. Then draw a thread around neck. Sew diagonal top corners for ears. Sew happy face on Teddy.

Scarf: cast on 75 stitches. Knit 4 rows. Cast off. Tie scarf on Teddy and sew to back of neck.

Teddies also require little bags made from material with a drawstring at the top. Finished size 10" x 13".

Good luck with your Teddy. A sick child is waiting for one.

The School Fete in July raised over £900.

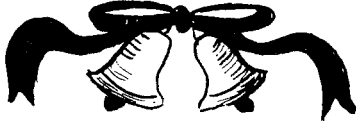
